PART A

Read the following text:

This is an abridged extract from the tapescript of an interview that Mrs. Thatcher gave to the London Broadcasting Company

Mrs. Thatcher: Well. I was brought up by a Victorian grandmother. We were taught to work jolly hard; you were taught to improve yourself; you were taught self-reliance; you were taught to live within your income; you were taught that cleanliness was next to godliness; erm... you were taught self-respect; you were taught always to give a hand to your neighbour; 5 er, you were taught tremendous pride in your country; you were taught to be a good member of your community. All of these things are Victorian values.

Interviewer: But the Victorian values encompassed as well workhouses and - shocking conditions in industry, all sorts of deplorable things that are part of the Victorian scene.

T: There's - there's some values which are eternal, and in fact you found a tremendous 10 improvement in conditions during Victorian times, because people were brought up with a sense of duty... You got an increasing prosperity during Victorian times, and an immense national pride.

I: So that's what you're trying to get back.

T: Well, if I might say so. If people are self-reliant, self-respecting, if they always lend a 15 hand to others, if they wish always to improve themselves and work very hard to do it, if they reckon they've got to be very good members of the community, and if they live within their income, and save, and that saving there is therefore for investment, it seems to me that you have the basis of an excellent society. I am very keen that every person should have the opportunity to be what I would call a man or woman of property...

I: ...own their own house... Right. You'd like everybody to have the freedom of choice to 20 buy their own property, to choose the kind of education their children have, to choose the kind of medicine in which - er - their families partakes. All kinds of advantages only offered

to the "haves", not to the "have nots".

Read the following text:

Oedipa is not at ease in a world of binary oppositions — ones and zeros. ...Oedipa is mentally in a world of 'if' and 'perhaps', walking through an accredited world of either/or. It is a part of her pain, her dilemma and, perhaps, her emancipation. At the auction which concludes the book, leaving all in suspension, the auctioneer is indeed likened to a priest — but also a 'puppet-master'. There is no way in which Oedipa can be sure just what kind of 'performance' she has been — is — present at. And there is no way in which we can, either. And, yet, at the end, as we both finish and wait to begin, something — and this is part of the deceptive magic of the book — seems to remain. Even while it stays away.
