PART A

Read the following text:

The widowed Queen was 42 years of age. She had ascended the throne when she was almost a child and already reigned for twenty-four years. What would now be her future, and what would happen to the government of the country?

Her love, her adoration of her husband was already legendary; he had been the mainspring of her life. She depended on him in every detail of her existence, important and unimportant. He drafted her letters and despatches; she never chose a bonnet or a dress without his approval, after more than twenty years of marriage she grudged every hour they were apart. She trusted his judgement, in the crises which were shaking Europe, completely; she would always take his advice. And now he was gone for ever.

The problem which confronted her was infinitely more complicated than when she ascended the throne. The British Empire had more than doubled in size, huge tracts – the vast subcontinent of India was only one – had come under British government. Exploration, railways, steamships and improved communications were opening up the world. There were few white patches left now denoting the unknown.

What would be the fate of the Queen?

Would she withdraw from the task of government, even abdicate? That was unlikely, having regard to her unfavourable feelings for the Prince of Wales. Might she come forward and be active in political affairs, especially foreign affairs, of which she knew a great deal and with which she had many links?

- 4. Account for the use of now in the text (II. 2 and 9) and say what it refers to.
- 5. Say how these words are formed:
 - a. subcontinent
 - b. unfavourable
- 6. Explain why the author has used the modal might in the sentence

"Might she come forward and be active..." (II. 17-18)

7. In 70-100 words describe the political situation in Britain at the time the text refers to, which explains the concern felt by all those who asked themselves "what would be the fate of the Queen?"

The purpose of help must not be to allow people merely to live a half-life, but rather to restore their self-discipline and their self-reliance.
