An elderly spinster<sup>(1)</sup> who used to scare off children has left over £5 million to one of Britain's top children's charities in her will. Dorothy Pickering, 93, left her mansion to *Save the Children Fund* making it the charity's biggest ever single donation.

A delighted spokesman for the charity said: "We can't believe it. It's fantastic. We were told Ms Pickering had left her home to us and we thought it was wonderful. But we were amazed when it was sold to a fund manager for £5.5 million. When the buyer knew where his money was going, he was absolutely delighted too. This is the biggest legacy<sup>(2)</sup> in our history. It's phenomenal. It will help us bring benefits to children all over the world."

Ms Pickering never married and inherited the fifteen-bedroom home in London's Notting Hill from her former boss. Her solicitor, Stephen Watmore, told The Mirror:

"She inherited the house in the 1950s from her ex-employer who, we believe, was a Jewish inventor. Apparently he came to Britain during the war to escape Nazi Germany. We believe she was the company secretary and her boss may have invented the plastic sachet<sup>(3)</sup> now used for shampoos."

Her will surprised neighbours as Dorothy used to terrify local children by chasing them off her garden when they tried to get their footballs back.

Mr Watmore added: "The local children thought she was a bit of a witch. In the end, she lived alone on one floor of this four-storey house. She didn't have any idea how much the house was worth, but I know she would be delighted. It certainly gave me a very warm feeling inside when I found out."

Save The Children say the money will help feeding programmes in countries like Ethiopia, as well as helping disadvantaged children in Britain.

The spokesman added: "This means we can plan ahead. Legacies are an important part of our funding. We are really grateful to Ms Pickering and her wonderful donation."


